School Building

Dovecotes opened in 1978 as a separate infant school and junior school. The two schools amalgamated in 1995 to form Dovecotes Primary School.

The Early Years Unit includes Terrific for Twos (provision known as Little Doves), Nursery and Reception classes. All year groups share a playground which is wellequipped and spacious.

Key Stage 1 has 3 classrooms. There is also a hall, an outdoor courtyard area and a breakout area which is used for group activities and intervention sessions.

The Key Stage 2 area is linked by an adjoining corridor which houses the Main Reception Office. There are four classroom areas, a large hall, dining room, music room, art room, courtyard, library and sensory room. There are two breakout areas used for group activities and intervention sessions. Key Stage 2 has a large, enclosed playground and playing field which serves the whole school.

School Organisation

Our pupils are grouped in classes according to age and are taught as a class. At present in nearly all key stages there are three classes supporting every two year groups.

Our Early Years Unit, was built in September 1996 for Nursery and Reception classes. There is also Terrific for Two provision that caters for 8 children in the morning and 8 in the afternoon session. They are known as "Little Doves"

School Sessions

School begins every day at 8.55 am and ends at 3.15 pm.

Arrival and Departure Times and Locations

Please note that there will no longer be a one-way system in operation. Pupils should go straight to their classes at the start of the school day and not onto playgrounds. Doors will open at 8:45am and will remain open until 8:55am when the school day begins.

Doors to be used are as follows:

Little Doves – Pupils should use the door to the Little Doves Unit across the Early Years Garden, which can be accessed via the blue gate adjacent to the main entrance. Little Doves will need to be collected from the same door at the end of their session. Please note that morning sessions finish at 11:45am; afternoon sessions begin at 12:30pm and finish at 3:30pm.

Nursery – Pupils should use the door to the Nursery classroom, which again can be accessed via the blue gate adjacent to the main entrance. Nursery children will need to be collected from the same door at the end of their session. Please note that morning sessions finish at 11:45am; afternoon sessions begin at 12:30pm and finish at 3:30pm.

Reception – Pupils should use the door on the KS1 playground which was the previous entry point for the Children's Centre. A teacher will be waiting to take them down to their Reception classroom. The KS1 playground can be accessed via the orange gate in the corner of the playground.

KS1 and KS2 – All pupils should access their classrooms via individual classroom doors apart from Year 1/2 and Year 2. Please note that for Year 1/2, the large gate in the corner, between the caretaker's house and the car park, will be open so that pupils can walk along the paved pathway to the KS1 cloakroom door to enter the school building.

All classes will dismiss from their classroom doors at 3:15pm (apart from Y1/2 who will use the KS1 cloakroom door plus Little Doves and Nursery). Pupils from Year 5 and 6 are permitted to walk home alone from week 2 of the term, once a consent letter has been returned to staff.

Your child will be sent out to you as soon as the member of staff who is responsible for dismissing the children calls them, because of safety, if you are unable to collect your child for any reason at the end of any session, we ask that you contact the school to advise the name of the person who will be collecting your child.

We also ask that you arrange for these young children to be collected promptly, as they become anxious if they feel forgotten.

Lunchtimes

Lunchtime for Reception Class is: 12:15pm - 1:15pm

Lunchtime for Key Stage 1 and 2 is: 12:30pm - 1:30pm

Reports

Once a year written progress reports on children are sent to parents. All parents are invited to Parent Evenings where they can discuss their child's performance with the class teacher. Parent Evenings are also held each term and each appointment lasts for 10 to 15 minutes. During this time the children's targets and progress will be reviewed.

Admission Arrangements

Parents wishing to place their children at Dovecotes Primary School are welcome to view our wonderful school during the school day. Admission Forms must be collected from the Admissions Team at the Civic Centre, Wolverhampton.

Admission Form

Our Admissions Officer will go through the Admissions Form when your child is admitted to this school. It is essential that we have as much information as possible to help us to cater for your child's individual needs. The information recorded will be treated in the strictest confidence. If there are any changes in your circumstances (change of address, phone number at home or work, family health etc.) the school must be informed immediately.

Admission Times

Children are admitted in September of each year. Children moving into the local area can be admitted any time of the year (subject to availability of places) as described on the authority's website.

Children are admitted to Nursery strictly in age order after their third birthday and as places become available.

The maximum number of children admitted in KS1 and KS2 to any one year group is 45. If the number of children wishing to enter school exceeds this number then the authority will allocate places using their admissions criteria outlined in their school admissions booklet.

Curriculum

All National Curriculum subjects are taught and all children have equal access to all areas of the curriculum.

Our curriculum is broad and balanced and is designed to inspire, motivate and meet the needs of all children.

Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 are taught the National Curriculum which covers Literacy, Mathematics, Science, Computing, Design Technology, History, Geography, Music, Art, P.E. Religious Education and PHSE.

Religious Education is taught to all children based on LA guidelines (Wolverhampton Agreed Syllabus), which is broadly Christian in nature. Parents wishing to have their children excluded from Religious Education / Assemblies may contact the Headteacher to arrange this and discuss alternative provision.

All children receive daily literacy and mathematics lessons. Reading is a vital part of our Curriculum and children receive specialist reading support each day following the Read Write Inc programme until they become confident readers.

All computers in the school have access to the Internet and are connected via Wolverhampton City Council Broadband.

Creative development is very important and music, art and sport all play an important role in the curriculum. Physical skills are developed through indoor and outdoor PE and swimming takes place for Years 4, 5 and 6.

To ensure a smooth transfer of our 11 year old children to their next school, we liaise with neighbourhood secondary schools in their final term of Year 6.

Nursery and Reception classes follow the Foundation Stage Curriculum which leads to children acquiring Early Learning Goals in the following areas: Personal, Social and Emotional development; Physical Development; Communication and Language; Literacy; Mathematics; Understanding the World and Expressive Arts and Design

Special Educational Needs

The school follows an agreed Code of Practice for children with Special Educational Needs (SEN). A designated member of staff acts as SEN co-ordinator (SENCO). Staff work with the SENCO to monitor and assess individual children and if necessary place them on the SEN register. If necessary, advice and support is sought from outside agencies. Parents are informed of their children's individual targets and regular reviews take place to decide on further action to be taken to support the needs of the child.

School Activities and Events

It is the aim of the school to pursue a wide range of educational visits, as we believe these play a vital role in the education of a child. The school will do everything in its power to ensure that every child is able to participate in the events.

Educational visits are arranged during the school year. Children in KS1 are taken to Kingswood Nursery / Infant Residential Centre when accommodation is available. Children in KS2 also have the opportunity to participate in residential visits.

A number of interests, both sporting and creative, are catered for in After School Clubs throughout the school year. Sports Days are held in the Summer Term.

Children are offered opportunities to take part in the school choir and learn a musical instrument.

Swimming Kit

Girls - Swimming costume

Boys – Swimming trunks (baggy shorts are not allowed as they tend to float off in the pool!)

Towel

Plastic bag to transport them in.

For Health and Safety reasons, no jewellery of any kind is to be worn except stud earrings.

Charging For Activities Policy

No charge is expected for after school, extra-curricular activities. Parents will be asked to make reasonable voluntary contributions towards school visits. If enough contributions are not received, visits may have to be cancelled. Any parent who has financial concerns regarding the payment of school trips should contact the Headteacher for a confidential discussion.

School Uniform

We have a very smart and sensibly priced uniform. Our school colours are royal blue and grey. Governors and staff strongly believe that wearing the uniform shows a pride in our school and a sense of belonging.

Polo shirts and sweatshirts are available from the school office. Children will need a T-shirt and Navy or Black Shorts/Jogging Bottoms for P.E (no football kits or branded sportswear please). All children need black pumps for indoor P.E and suitable footwear for games outside. Footwear is parent's responsibility.

ALL UNIFORM AND P.E KIT SHOULD BE CLEARLY MARKED WITH YOUR CHILD'S NAME AND P.E KIT SHOULD BE KEPT IN A SUITABLE BAG.

IN THE INTEREST OF SAFETY AND SECURITY. NO JEWELLERY SHOULD BE WORN. CHILDREN WITH PIERCED EARS MAY OF COURSE WEAR STUDS BUT NO DANGLERS PLEASE.

School Meals and Lunchtime

Parents have the following options for their child at lunchtime:-

- 1. Children can remain at school and eat a cooked meal. These are cooked on the premises and provide a nutritious, well-balanced lunch. MEALS ARE PAID FOR IN ADVANCE ON A WEEKLY BASIS EACH MONDAY MORNING. THE MONEY SHOULD BE SENT INTO SCHOOL IN AN ENVELOPE CLEARLY MARKED WITH YOUR CHILD'S NAME AND "DINNER MONEY".
- 2. Many children qualify for a free school meal Application forms can be obtained from the school office.
- 3. Parents receiving Universal Credit may also be entitled to Flexible Charged Meals; this scheme has been running in Wolverhampton for several years; if your child is eligible, you will have to pay £2 for a school meal for each child.
- 4. Children can remain in school and bring a packed lunch but no glass bottles or fizzy drinks are allowed. The lunch should be in a suitable plastic container clearly marked with your child's name.

Lunchtimes are a happy time and therefore good behaviour is essential. Occasionally, if a child persists in behaving in an unacceptable manner, he/she may not be allowed to stay on site at lunchtime. Instances such as this are rare and we ask for parents support in helping us to encourage our children to behave well with each other. Learning to get on with other people is an important part of growing up.

Milk

Milk is available at lunchtime for ALL pupils (paid for by the school). Whole milk is available for Nursery and Reception children. Children in KS1 and KS2 have access to semi-skimmed milk.

Bringing Money to School

All money coming into school for visits, purchase of uniform etc. must be placed in an envelope marked with your child's name and the reason for the money. All money should be handed in to the teacher during registration. School can take no responsibility for any other money that your child may bring in to school. No valuables should ever be brought into school.

Fruit in Schools

In 2002 the Government introduced a "National Fruit Scheme" for 4 – 6 year olds. Under the scheme each child is entitled to receive a free piece of fruit each school day to encourage healthy eating. KS1 children have fruit instead of snacks or biscuits.

Fresh water is available all day to our children from water coolers in each of the shared area, this is in accordance with Department of Health guidelines. KS2 children are encouraged to bring fruit or a healthy snack bar from home for break times.

Breakfast Club

Mondays to Fridays 8.00am to 8.45 am we have our Breakfast Club. We consider breakfast to be an important meal to set children up for the day and know how difficult it can sometimes be to encourage children to eat a nutritious meal first thing in the morning. At Breakfast Club, breakfast will be cooked and served from our own kitchen every day during term time. There is an excellent choice of reasonably priced food choices such as toast, yoghurts, pancakes, bacon baps, crumpets and cereal. Breakfast is on a self serve pay as you go basis – children must have the money with them, no money can be brought in later.

Change of Address / Emergency Contact

It may happen that in an emergency the school will need to contact you promptly. For this reason, please keep us informed of any changes in contact information.

Mobile Phones

Mobile phones are only allowed for year 6 children who may be using public transport to get to and from school and parents have to sign the mobile phone agreement from before any child can bring a phone into school. Phones have to be handed into the school office for safe keeping.

Absence from School

Lateness

Children who are late will be marked absent (unauthorised) if they arrive after the registers have been closed at 9:05 am and 1:30pm, unless prior notice has been given. A record will be made of all children who arrive after 9:05; this record is monitored by the Headteacher and Education Welfare Officer and action taken where necessary. All children who are late or who are returning to school after medical appointments must report to the school office and be signed in by the Parent/carer.

Absences

The school should be informed immediately, either by telephone, writing or in person of any child who is absent everyday. If we do not know the reason for a child being away from school then the absence is regarded as unauthorised.

If a child has not arrived in school by 9:20am and we have not heard as to why they are absent, the school will contact home to check on their whereabouts. Where contact cannot be made and no reason has been given for absence The Educational Welfare Officer may be asked to make a home visit.

Attendance registers are regularly checked by the Educational Welfare Officer on behalf of the Local Authority.

Common Illnesses

Health

We have regular visits from the school nurse. Please contact the school office if you would like to see her.

Medicine

School cannot take responsibility for administering medicines to children. However, parents are welcome to come into school to give tablets / medicines if this is essential during the school day. In special circumstances, parents should come to see the Headteacher so that specific arrangements can be made if necessary.

Headlice

Please follow the school advice that can be found on the website in the Parent Section/ Medical. Children with long hair must have this tied back.

Winter Weather

If we experience severe snow falls in the winter there are occasions when the school may have to close.

If the school has to take this action then the information will be relayed via the school texting service and the school website.

Road Safety

Please help us to train children to be careful whenever they are out on the roads.

Children in Years 5 and 6 may like to cycle to school. If so, they must have a 'roadworthy' bicycle, and a lock to secure the bike to our bike rack; they must also have a cycle helmet which must be worn at all times when they are riding their bike. Letters to give your child permission to come to school using their bike are available from the School Office.

Home School Partnership

The education of children is a partnership between home and school and we feel that a good relationship between teachers and parents is very important. Parents are always welcome to visit the school and discuss the education of their children or to sort out problems, which may arise from time to time.

The Headteacher is always willing to see parents to discuss any difficulties or deal with enquiries.

Parent / teacher consultations are held every term. It is an opportunity for you to discuss your children's progress and see their work.

Written reports are sent home at the end of the school year in July and parents are given the opportunity to discuss the report and the year's progress with the class teacher.

It is important that parents keep the school informed of up to date telephone numbers and addresses and also of anything that might affect a child's performance.

The school has a homework policy which we ask parents to support. Children are encouraged to take reading books home every night. It is most helpful if parents can find time to hear children read at home and ensure that the books taken home are cared for and returned each day.

The school expects all parents to sign the 'Home / School Agreement,' which outlines these main principles.

Pastoral Care

Behaviour in School

Every child has the right to an environment that provides an opportunity to excel.

The school expects a high standard of behaviour from children and has a clear Behaviour Policy that promotes a positive approach. A system of rewarding good behaviour is actively encouraged and the policy outlines procedures for dealing with incidents of unacceptable behaviour. Parents will be involved in discussions at an early stage if children are not adhering to our behavioural code of conduct.

Children are expected to have a respect for and tolerance towards each other. Children are not expected to fight or to behave in an aggressive manner. Anti-social behaviour, racist behaviour and bullying will not be tolerated. Children are expected to resolve their differences by discussion and reason with staff and each other.

Parents are expected to support the school in its policy on behaviour. Parents may be asked into school to discuss persistent bad behaviour by their children. Parents are expected to work with the school in improving their child's poor behaviour.

Parental Involvement

Parents are welcomed into school to support with curriculum work such as making costumes for presentations, sports day, parties, fairs and other events organised during the school year.

Health and Welfare

Parents should inform the school of any medical conditions / allergies.

It is expected that children suffering with asthma will have an in-date inhaler in school. The school keeps an emergency inhaler, which is regularly updated by the school nurse, to be used in emergencies.

The school medical service carries out a programme of health surveillance that includes height, weight, vision and dental screening. Our school nurse can be contacted should you wish to discuss any problems concerning your child.

Accessibility

At Dovecotes, we are committed to promoting educational and social inclusion. We ensure that access and opportunities are equally available to everyone - diversity is valued.

Child Protection

At Dovecotes, we take very seriously, our duties to safeguard children. Staff work closely with all Wolverhampton agencies to ensure the well-being and protection of all children in our care. We continually strive to make sure everyone sees Dovecotes as a safe place to be.
